Composite classes help schools manage enrolment numbers effectively, ensuring balanced class sizes. This approach allows schools to create the best possible learning environments while maintaining teacher-student ratios that support effective learning and engagement.

What the Research Says

- A major review by Veenman (1995) across twelve countries found no significant difference in academic achievement between composite and single-year classes, with some social and emotional advantages for students in multi-age settings.
- A University of Glasgow study concluded that composite classes have no negative impact on academic performance and may even offer social benefits that are harder to quantify.
- Anderson & Parvan (1993) found that composite classes can benefit students of all ability levels, with the majority of studies showing equal or improved academic outcomes.
